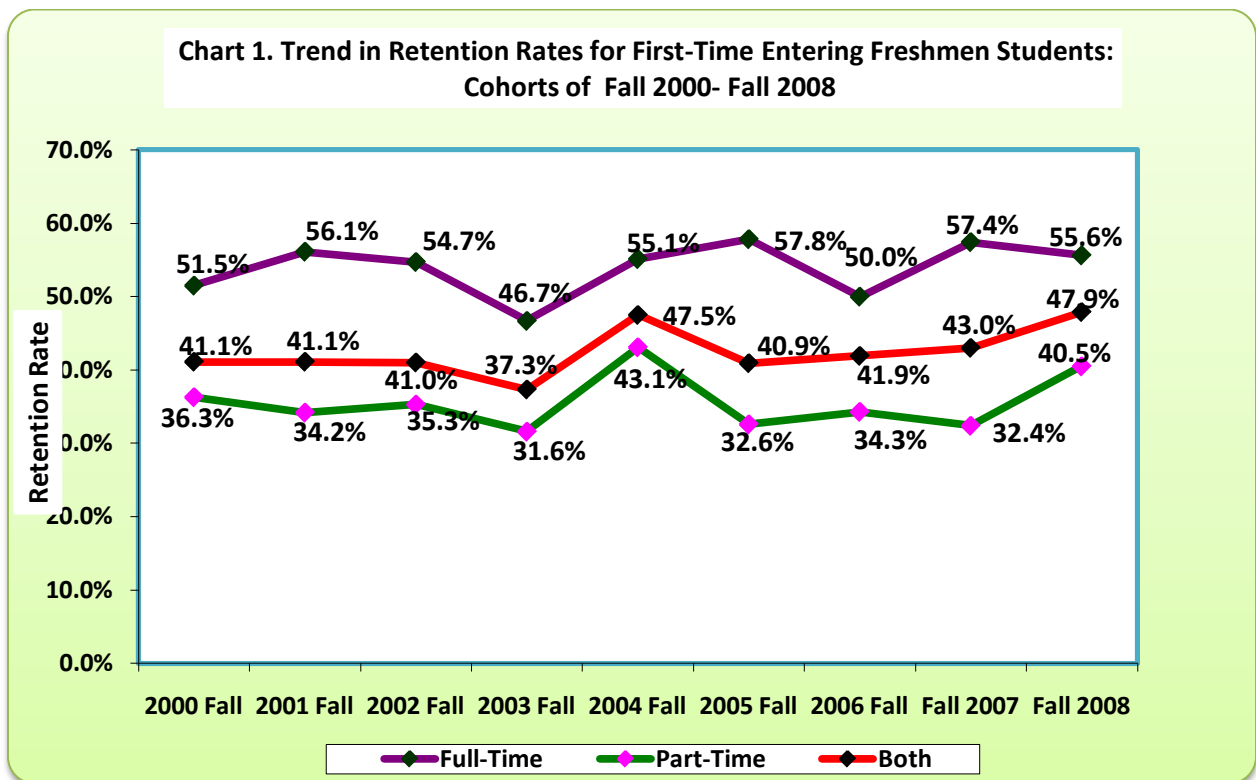

## 1 Background

This report presents retention data on the University of the District of Columbia's first-time entering freshmen students. To provide clarity to this cohort of students, we broke down our analysis into informative subsets including: full-time and part-time status, gender, ethnicity, degree objective, college or school enrollment, age, and residency.

## 2 General Retention Trend

Chart 1 shows retention trends by full-time status, part-time status and for both statuses combined. For full-time students, from Fall 2000 to Fall 2008, we experienced a four percentage point increase from 51.5% to 55.6% with five point drops in Fall 2003 and Fall 2006. Our part-time students experienced a similar increase from 36.3% in Fall 2000 to 40.5% in Fall 2008. However, there was a 7 percentage point spike in Fall 2004. The combined retention rate for both full and part-time students showed a significant increase from 41% in Fall 2000 to 47.9% in 2008, with a similar spike in Fall 2004 up to nearly 48%.

### 3 Comparative Data by Student Characteristics

The following tables show comparative retention data for Fall 2007 and Fall 2008 cohorts by student characteristics (i.e. full-time and part-time status, gender, ethnicity, degree objective, college/schools, age, residency, and DC Wards). At the end of the report, we also include an Appendix with summary characteristics, major fields of study, and trend data.

#### 3.1 Full-time/Par-time Status

Table 1 shows cohort size and retention rates for full and part-time students for Fall semester 2007 and Fall semester 2008. The data shows that cohort size between full and part-time students is lessening. The 2007 cohort had 475 part-time students and 350 full-time students. In 2008, there was almost equal distribution between full-time (331) and part-time (348) students. For full-time students, retention rates decreased slightly by nearly two percentage points from 57.4% in Fall 2007 to 55.6% in Fall 2008. At the same time, retention rates for part-time students increased over 8 percentage points from 32.4% in 2007 to 40.5% in 2008. The overall combined retention rate for full and part-time students increased by nearly 5 percentage points from 43% to 47.9%.

### 3.2 Gender

Table 2 shows that female students had a higher retention rate than their male counterparts. The retention rate for female students increased from 40.4% in 2007 to 49.8% in 2008. However, the retention rate for male students decreased slightly from 47% in 2007 to 44.9% in 2008.

### 3.3 Ethnicity

Table 3 shows the retention rate by ethnicity. Hispanic students had the highest retention rate increasing from 43.9% in 2007 to 59.2% in 2008. The cohort size remained small with 66 and 71 students respectively. Asian students had the largest decline in student retention dropping 66.7% in 2007 to 42.9% in 2008; however, the cohort size remained small with 12 and 14 students respectively. African American students represented the largest cohort with 623 students in 2007, declining to 537 in 2008. The African American student retention rate increased slightly from 44.6% in 2007 to 46.6% in 2008.

### 3.4 Degree Objective

Table 4 shows retention rates by degree objective. In 2007, UDC retained 45.1% of its first-time students seeking baccalaureate degrees; however that number increased by almost 5 percentage points to 49.9 for the 2008 cohort. It is significant to note that the cohort size for baccalaureate degree seeking students decreased from 475 students in 2007 to 379 in 2008. With regard to our Associate/Certificate seeking students, 40.3% of our students returned in 2007 and that number increased to 45% in 2008. The cohort size of our Associate/Certificate seeking students also decreased from 350 students in 2007 to 282 in 2008.

### 3.5 College/School

Table 5 shows an overall retention rate increase of slightly over 4 percentage points from 43% in 2007 to 47.9% in 2008. However, much of that increase is a result of the College of Arts and Sciences' 3.3% percentage point increase from 44% in 2007 to 47.3% in 2008. However, the College of Arts and Sciences cohort size decreased from 609 students in 2007 to 501 students in 2008. Both the School of Business and School of Engineering also experienced increases in retention rates. The School of Engineering had an 18.1 percentage point increase from 37.6% in 2007 to 55.7% in 2008. However, the cohort size decreased from 101 students in 2007 to 70 students in 2008. The School of Business experienced an 2.8 percentage point increase from 42.6% in 2007 to 45.4% in 2008. The School of Business had a similar decline in cohort size from 115 students in 2007 to 108 students in 2008.

### 3.6 Age

Table 6 shows retention rates by age groups. Our most populous age group, 18-19 year old students, showed a 10.1% increase from 2007 to 2008. However, that cohort decreased in size from 352 students in 2007 to 219 students in 2008. The second most populous age group, 20-21 year olds, had a 3% increase from 2007 to 2008 and decreased in cohort size from 184 students in 2007 to 183 students in 2008. The age group with the highest retention rate increase was the 50-64 year old cohort. That group experienced a 25.3% increase in retention; however, the cohort size was small with 24 students in 2007 and declining to 11 students in 2008. The less than 18 year old age group had the sharpest decline in retention at 8.9 percentage points.

### 3.7 D.C. Residence

Table 7 shows the retention rate by residence. The retention rate for in-state students increased from 44.1% in 2007 to 47% in 2008. However, the retention rate for out-of-state students increased from 40% in 2007 to 51.5% in 2008. The cohort size for in-state students decreased slightly, while out-of-state students decreased by 123 students.

### 3.8 District of Columbia Wards

Table 8 shows retention rates by Ward. Ward 7, our most populous Ward, had a 9.1% retention rate increase from 2007 to 2008, and the cohort size remained stable with 164 students and 160 respectively. The second most populous Ward, Ward 4, had a small 1.2 percentage point decrease from 2007 to 2008 and similar to Ward 7, the cohort size was relatively unchanged. Wards 1, 2, and 3 all experienced significant declines in student retention. Ward 3 had the largest decline in retention with a 15.4 percentage point decrease; Ward 2 had an 11.5% decline; and Ward 1 had a 10.9% decline; however, the cohort sizes for Wards 2 and 3 were small with less than 15 students each.
