INTRODUCTION

This enrollment profile presents a comparative statistical summary of student enrollment at the University of the District of Columbia (UDC) for the Fall 2007 and Fall 2008 semesters. First we present demographic characteristics of our applicant pool and admitted students including the percentage of change, which is followed by enrollment data. For Fall semester 2007, the total on-campus enrollment (excluding students enrolled in the Maadi program in Egypt) was **5,172**. We had a small 4.1% decline to **4,959** in the Fall 2008 semester. The enrollment figures for the Maadi program are presented separately in Table 4 of this report.

ADMISSION

Table 1 below shows the number of applicants and admitted students for the Fall 2007 and Fall 2008 semesters by ethnicity and gender. According to the figures in Table 1, the majority of the applicants (2,682) for Fall 2007 and (2,533) for Fall 2008 self identified as Black students. In 2007, 87.7% of Black applicants were admitted as were 89.8% for Fall 2008.

For both semesters we admitted more female than male applicants. About 88% of the female applicants were admitted for the Fall 2007 while 89.2 % of the female applicants were admitted for the Fall 2008 semester. The percentage of male applicants admitted increased from 83.9% for the Fall 2007 to 87.7% for the Fall 2008 semester. The overall admission rate for the university increased from 86.3% of the applicants for Fall 2007 to 88.6% for the Fall 2008 semester.

The data trend shows that the number of applicants declined from 3,424 in Fall 2007 to 3,193 for the Fall 2008 semester. During the same period, the number of students admitted to the University also declined from 2,954 in Fall 2007 to 2,830 in the Fall 2008 semester. However, the proportion of admitted students grew from 86.3% Fall 2007 to 88.6% for the Fall 2008 semester.

UNIVERSITY OF THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA OVERALL STUDENT ENROLLMENT

From Fall semester 2007 to Fall semester 2008, UDC experienced a 4.1% decrease in enrollment from 5,172 to 4,959 students. The College of Arts and Sciences had nearly a 6% decrease, while the School of Business and Public Administration enrollment fell 4%, followed by a 2.4% decline in the School of Engineering and Applied Sciences.

DAVID A. CLARKE SCHOOL OF LAW

The total enrollment for the UDC David A. Clarke School of Law showed a 6.2% increase from 241 students in Fall 2007 to 256 students in Fall 2008. However, enrollment by classification revealed a 5.4% decline for first year students that was offset by a 17.1% increase in second year students and a 4.3% increase in third year students. The data also show that nearly 10% of the growth was from non-resident students, with an 8.4% increase in male students.

THE MAADI PROGRAM (CAIRO, EGYPT)

The figures in Table 4 show a significant increase (42.5%) in MAADI program enrollment from 440 in Fall 2007 to 627 in Fall 2008. The School of Business and Public Administration had a modest 8% decrease while the School of Engineering and Applied Sciences had nearly an 80% increase.

ENROLLMENT BY COLLEGE/SCHOOL

The College of Arts and Sciences had the highest enrollment of the three Colleges and Schools both for the Fall 2007 (68.4%) and the Fall 2008 semester (67.5%); however it also experienced the largest decline in enrollment at 4.7%. The School of Business and Public Administration accounted for 21.3% and 21.5 % for Fall 2007 and Fall 2008 respectively, and experienced a 4% decline from Fall 2007 to Fall 2008. The School of Engineering and Applied Sciences has the smallest enrollment accounting for 10.3 % and 11.0% for the Fall 2007 and Fall 2008, respectively; however it showed a small 2.4% increase in enrollment.

ENROLLMENT BY D.C. WARD

Wards 8 (11.7%), 5 (9.4%), 4 (9.2%) and 2 (8.2%) had the largest declines in student enrollment. Overall, there was a 6.1% decrease in student enrollment from DC Wards.

Students from DC Wards accounted for 74.9 % of the total enrollment for the Fall 2007 and 73.7% for the Fall 2008, with a 6.1% decrease in enrollment. Non-DC Ward students accounted for 25.1% and 26.3% of the total enrollment for Fall 2007 and Fall 2008, respectively.

ENROLLMENT BY ETHNICITY

Table 9 presents on-campus total student enrollment by ethnicity for Fall 2007 and 2008 semesters. Black students made up 77.6% and 77.0% of the total enrollment for Fall 2007 and Fall 2008, respectively. Asian students accounted for 3% in Fall 2007 and 3.8% in Fall 2008. Hispanic students accounted for 5.9% and 6.8% for the Fall 2007 and 2008, respectively, while White students accounted for 7.1% of the total enrollment for Fall 2007 and 7.0% for Fall 2008. Both Asian (23.1%) and Hispanics (9.9%) experienced increases in student enrollment between Fall 2007 and Fall 2008.

ENROLLMENT BY AGE

Student enrollment by age-group showed that 34.3% of our Fall 2007 and 33.5% of our Fall 2008 student enrollment were grouped together in the 22-24 and the 25-29 age groups. The Fall 2007, 25-29 age group accounted for 18.9%, with a slight decrease to 18.7% in Fall 2008. The Fall 2007, 22-24 age group accounted for 15.4%, with a slight decrease to 14.8% in Fall 2008.

FULL-TIME AND PART-TIME ENROLLMENT BY DEPARTMENT AND COLLEGE/SCHOOL

Tables 11 and 12 show full-time and part-time student enrollment by department and college/school, both for undergraduate and graduate students for Fall 2007 and Fall 2008. The College of Arts and Sciences department of Nursing and Allied Health had the largest enrollment both for Fall 2007 (781) and 2008 (815). In the School of Business and Public Administration, the department of Management, Hospitality and Graduate Studies had the largest enrollment Fall 2007 (504) and Fall 2008 (494). The School of Engineering and Applied Sciences department of Engineering Architecture & Aerospace technology had the largest enrollment for Fall 2007 (274) and Fall 2008 (283). The David A. Clark School of Law had a total enrollment of 241 and 256 for the Fall 2007 and Fall 2008, respectively.

Student enrollment by full-time and part-time attendance shows that part-time students make up the larger proportion of students at the University of the District of Columbia, both in the Fall 2007 and Fall 2008 semesters. In the Fall 2007, about 46% (**2,376** students) out of the total headcount of **5,172** were full-time students, while part-time students accounted for the remaining 54%. Fall 2008, about 43% (**2,129** students) out of the total headcount of **4,959** were full-time students, while part-time students accounted for the remaining 57%.

ENROLLMENT BY SCHOOL ORIGIN

Table 14 shows the number and percentage of first-time freshman who graduated from the District of Columbia feeder schools (public, private and charter schools). The majority of the first-time entering freshmen came from DC public schools both for Fall 2007 (80.1%) and Fall 2008 (80.9%). Students from charter schools accounted 18.9% and 18.2% of the total first-time freshman enrollment for Fall 2007 and Fall 2008, respectively. A small number of students came from the D.C. private schools. All school types showed moderate declines.

SUMMARY

1. Compared to the Fall 2007, the Fall 2008 number of applicants to UDC declined by 5%, although the university's admission rate increased from 86.3% to 88.4%.
2. The overall enrollment at UDC (excluding the Maadi program) declined by about 4% from 5,172 in Fall 2007 to 4,959 in Fall 2008. However, enrollment at the David a Clarke School of Law for the Fall 2008 increased by about 6%.
3. Student enrollment by full-time and part-time attendance shows that the larger proportion of the student population at the University of the District of Columbia is part-time. Full-time students accounted for about 46% and 43% of the total enrollment for the Fall 2007 and Fall 2008, respectively.
4. Enrollment comparison among the College of Arts and Sciences, School of Business and Public Administration and School of Engineering and Applied Sciences shows that the College of Arts and Sciences had the largest number of students; however, it also had a 5.9% decline of enrollment for Fall 2008.
5. The number of students with undecided major declined from 507 in Fall 2007 to 444 in Fall 2008.
6. Information by ethnic background of the students revealed that Black students constituted the majority 77.6% for the Fall 2007 and 77% for the Fall 2008.
7. The majority of the students enrolling at UDC came from Ward 4 and Ward 7.
8. About 80% in Fall 2007 and 81 % in Fall 2008 of first time freshmen from major DC feeder schools came from public schools.
