Chartered in 1851 as the only urban, land grant university in the United States, the University of the District of Columbia is the only fully-accredited public institution of higher education in the nation's capital. Today, the UDC System supports a broad mission of education, research and community service. The System includes a selective admissions Flagship University, and an open admissions Community College and offers associates, bachelors and masters degrees in the College of Agriculture, Urban Sustainability and Environmental Sciences, College of Arts and Science, School of Business and Economics and the School of Engineering and Applied Sciences. Also included in the University System is the David A. Clarke School of Law.
